Why did Britain want an empire? Britain wanted an empire to show their power, the more countries and colonies they ruled the more powerful they were.


Who was in charge of the British Empire? The monarchy ruled the British Empire, during the Victorian era Queen Victoria rued the empire and was known as the "Grandmother of the British Empire".

What is a "mother country"?

A "mother Country" was the country who ruled the empire; in this case, Britain ruled the empire.

When did the British Empire end?

By 1979 the empire was reduced to only a few places around the world. In 1997 Hong Kong was transferred to China, and Prince Charles said that was "the end of the Empire".
