

The story of Jacob (Israel)	Isaac had twin sons – Esau and Jacob. When Isaac was approaching the end of his life, he decided he wanted to bless Esau. Jacob heard about this and wanted to receive the blessing instead of Esau. Isaac was old and could not see very well, so Jacob decided to trick his father into thinking that he was Esau. Esau was furious. Jacob was afraid and ran away into the wilderness. There, God spoke to him in a dream, reminding him of the covenant that he had made with Jacob's grandfather, Abraham. Again, God said that Abraham would have many descendants and that they would have their own land. Jacob married and had 12 sons, each of whom later had his own large family. God changed Jacob's name to Israel, and the families of his sons became known as the Twelve Tribes of Israel.						
The story of Joseph	Joseph was Jacob's favourite son. Jacob gave him a stunning long-sleeved robe to wear. It would have been difficult for Joseph to work hard looking after his father's sheep and goats while wearing this robe, and he probably was not made to take on all of the tasks that his brothers had to do. Jacob's other sons hated Joseph and treated him unkindly. Joseph used to tell his brothers that he had dreams about them bowing down to him. One day, Joseph's brothers decided that they had had enough of him, so they sold him to the Egyptians as a slave.  When Joseph arrived in Egypt he was sold to a man names Potiphar, who was one of the king's officials. Joseph gained Potiphar's trust and was eventually put in charge of the whole household. Potiphar falsely believed that Joseph tried to sleep with his wife, so sent him to prison.  Joseph had an ability to understand dreams, the king freed him from prison to help him work out what his dreams meant. After Joseph was correct, he was made governor of Egypt.						
The Israelites as slaves	By the beginning of the second book of the Bible, Exodus, the Israelites were living in Egypt as slaves. Despite this, they were a strong people, and their population was increasing. The king of Egypt was concerned that if war broke out, the Israelites might join forces with the Egyptians' enemies. He made them work long, gruelling hours in the cornfields or constructing buildings, hoping that this would stop them reproducing. But the Israelites continued to increase. The king commanded all his people to throw any new born Israelite boys into the river Nile so that they would drown.  One Israelite woman gave birth to a boy who she didn't want to be killed, so put him in a basket and sent him down the Nile. He was discovered by the princess who chose to raise him as her own son.  When Moses was older, he murdered a slave driver who killed an Israelite, this crime was reported and Moses						
The Exodus	escaped to Midian.  Moses became a shepherd, one day he saw a burning bush, when he moved closer to it, he heard God speak to him. God told him to free the Israelites from Egypt. The Pharaoh refused Moses when he first asked to free the Israelites. To help convince the Pharaoh, God sent 10 plagues upon Egypt – the first was turning the river Nile into blood. The final plague was the 'plague of the firstborn son', where all the first born sons in Egypt died. Devastated by his son's death, Pharaoh let the Israelites go. He then changes his mind, and sent his army to recapture the Israelites, they escaped when Moses split the red sea.

David and Goliath	When the Israelites were living in Canaan, they were at war with the Philistines. One philistine, Goliath, was 9 feet tall and an expert warrior. He challenged the Israelites to send their best fighter against him. If an Israelite won, Goliath said that he and the Philistines would become the Israelites' slaves. If he won, then the Israelites would become the Philistines' slaves. David a shepherd's boy accepted the offer, and defeated Goliath by firing a stone at this skill using a sling.  David eventually became king of Israel and God promised him that his descendants would always be the kings of God's people.						

## Homework 1: Joseph interpreting dreams

Read the biblical text and answer the questions

<b>40</b> Some time later, the cupbearer and the baker of the king of Egypt offended their master, the king of Egypt. <sup>2</sup> Pharaoh was angry with his two officials, the chief cupbearer and the chief baker, <sup>3</sup> and put them in custody in the house of the captain of the guard, in the same prison where Joseph was confined. <sup>4</sup> The captain of the guard assigned them to Joseph, and he attended them.
After they had been in custody for some time, <sup>5</sup> each of the two men—the cupbearer and the baker of the king of Egypt, who were being held in prison—had a dream the same night, and each dream had a meaning of its own.
<sup>9</sup> So the chief cupbearer told Joseph his dream. He said to him, "In my dream I saw a vine in front of me, <sup>10</sup> and on the vine were three branches. As soon as it budded, it blossomed, and its clusters ripened into grapes. <sup>11</sup> Pharaoh's cup was in my hand, and I took the grapes, squeezed them into Pharaoh's cup and put the cup in his hand."
<sup>12</sup> "This is what it means," Joseph said to him. "The three branches are three days. <sup>13</sup> Within three days Pharaoh will lift up your head and restore you to your position, and you will put Pharaoh's cup in his hand, just as you used to do when you were his cupbearer. <sup>14</sup> But when all goes well with you, remember me and show me kindness; mention me to Pharaoh and get me out of this prison. <sup>15</sup> I was forcibly carried off from the land of the Hebrews, and even here I have done nothing to deserve being put in a dungeon."
<sup>16</sup> When the chief baker saw that Joseph had given a favorable interpretation, he said to Joseph, "I too had a dream: On my head were three baskets of bread. <sup>17</sup> In the top basket were all kinds of baked goods for Pharaoh, but the birds were eating them out of the basket on my head."
<sup>18</sup> "This is what it means," Joseph said. "The three baskets are three days. <sup>19</sup> Within three days Pharaoh will lift off your head and impale your body on a pole. And the birds will eat away your flesh."
<sup>20</sup> Now the third day was Pharaoh's birthday, and he gave a feast for all his officials. He lifted up the heads of the chief cupbearer and the chief baker in the presence of his officials: <sup>21</sup> He restored the chief cupbearer to his position, so that he once again put the cup into Pharaoh's hand— <sup>22</sup> but he impaled the chief baker, just as Joseph had said to them in his interpretation.

#### Exodus 1:6-14

- <sup>6</sup> Joseph and all his brothers died. So did all their children. <sup>7</sup> The people of Israel had many children. The number of them greatly increased. There were so many of them that they filled the land.
- <sup>8</sup> Then a new king came to power in Egypt. Joseph didn't mean anything to him. <sup>9</sup> "Look," he said to his people. "The Israelites are far too many for us. <sup>10</sup> Come. We must deal with them carefully. If we don't, there will be even more of them. Then if war breaks out, they'll join our enemies. They'll fight against us and leave the country."
- <sup>11</sup> So the Egyptians put slave drivers over the people of Israel. The slave drivers treated them badly and made them work hard. The Israelites built the cities of Pithom and Rameses so Pharaoh could store things there. <sup>12</sup> But the worse the slave drivers treated the Israelites, the more Israelites there were. So the Egyptians became afraid of them. <sup>13</sup> They made them work hard. They didn't show them any pity. <sup>14</sup> The people suffered because of their hard labor. The slave drivers forced them to work with bricks and mud. And they made them do all kinds of work in the fields. The Egyptians didn't show them any pity at all. They made them work very hard.
