



The Rust Belt

The Rust Belt refers to an area of the northern United States. The area is mostly the states near the Great Lakes. This area was once known for steel production and heavy industry.

That industry has greatly decreased since the middle of the 20th century. Much of this decrease is because of the United States using manufacturers from other countries.

Most Rust Belt cities, for example, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and Youngstown, Ohio, have had very large decrease in population since the 1950s and 1960s.



Lesson 14 BIG Question: Where do people live in the USA?



Population Distribution: The pattern of where people live. Places which are sparsely populated contain few people. Places which are densely populated contain many people.

Population Density: Measurement of the number of people in an area. This can be calculated by dividing the number of people by the area in question.

$$\text{Population density} = \text{total population} \div \text{total land area in km}^2$$

What are the impacts on the USA


- Illegal migration costs the USA millions of dollars for border patrols and prisons
- Mexicans are seen as a drain on the USA economy
- Migrant workers keep wages low which affects Americans
- They cause problems in cities due cultural and racial issues
- Mexican migrants benefit the US economy by working for low wages
- Mexican culture has enriched the US border states with food, language and music
- The incidents of TB has been increasing greatly due to the increased migration

Lesson 17 BIG Question: Should Donald Trump have built his wall?

Before Donald Trump took office, there were 654 miles (just over 1,000km) of barrier along the southern border - made up of 354 miles of barriers to stop pedestrians and 300 miles of anti-vehicle fencing. In the run-up to his election victory, Mr Trump promised to build a wall along the border's entire 2,000-mile length. He later clarified that it would only cover half of that - with nature, such as mountains and rivers, helping to take care of the rest.

Lesson 18 BIG Question: Is the USA the world's leading superpower?

Soft power is the ability to attract and co-opt, rather than coerce (contrast hard power). In other words, soft power involves shaping the preferences of others through appeal and attraction.

Military, economy and political influence. These are all hard power strategies used to influence the behaviour or interests of other political bodies/countries.



Economy

- The USA's economy is the largest in the world – GDP per capita is \$56,084 in 2017.
- It produces more wealth than any other country in the world.
- The US \$ is the main currency in International trade



Military

- The world spends over \$1200 billion a year on armies, warships, fighter planes and weapons.
- The USA spends the most with \$615 billion in 2017.



Politics and power

The US government is one of the largest, wealthiest and strongest governments in the world, so have a lot of influence on other countries.

- It gives aid to LEDCs
- It often uses force or threatens to use force which can create enemies.



Cultural influence

- American culture travels all over the World

Lesson 19 BIG Question: How did 9/11 affect the USA?

On **September 11th 2001**, 4 planes were hijacked resulting in the deaths of around 3,000 innocent people, from more than 90 different countries and of all races and religions.

The terrorists chose to attack America because it's so powerful. Its influence can be felt across the planet and many people don't like it. American films, TV shows and music can be seen and heard everywhere, spreading American values. American companies such as McDonalds, Starbucks and Coca Cola can be found in most countries, bringing with them a taste of the American lifestyle. American soldiers have been involved in conflicts all over the world, and most recently in the Middle East where most people are Muslim.

The people who planned and carried out the attacks were terrorists from a worldwide organisation called Al Qaeda. Al Qaeda means "The Base" in Arabic and it was set up by a man called Osama bin Laden in 1988. A terrorist is someone who uses violence and threats in an attempt to force societies to change, and there are three main changes that Al Qaeda want:

- ❑ First of all they want to get rid of western influences from Muslim countries. This means getting rid of everything from foreign soldiers and global companies, to pop music and skinny jeans. Which means they want to ban anything that does not fit in with their view of Islam.
- ❑ Secondly, they want to fight governments that they think are corrupt. Which means any government that does not agree with their view of Islam.
- ❑ Thirdly, they want to unite all Muslims under one worldwide leader. Which means all Muslims who agree with Al Qaeda's view of Islam under the leadership of someone Al Qaeda would choose. They are against any Muslim who does not agree with them. Which is most of them.

A total of 2,996 people were killed in the 9/11 attacks including the 19 terrorist hijackers aboard the four airplanes. Citizens from 78 countries died in New York, Washington D.C and Pennsylvania.



Location

Alaska is a state in the United States that is located in the far northwest of North America. It is bordered by Canada to the east, the Arctic Ocean to the north and the Pacific Ocean to the south and west. Alaska is the largest state in the U.S. and it was the 49th state to be admitted into the Union. Alaska joined the U.S. on January 3, 1959. Alaska is known for its largely undeveloped land, mountains, glaciers, harsh climate and biodiversity.

Alaska is the largest state based on area in the U.S., and it has an extremely varied topography. The state has numerous islands like the Aleutian Islands which extend west from the Alaska Peninsula. Many of these islands are volcanic. The state is also home to 3.5 million lakes and has extensive areas of marshland and wetland permafrost. Glaciers cover 16,000 square miles (41,000 sq. km) of land and the state has rugged mountain ranges like the Alaska and Wrangell Ranges as well as flat tundra landscapes.

Lesson 22: Big question: What issues does Alaska face due to extraction of resources?

Alaska's resources

The United States owned 99 percent of the land within the Territory of Alaska. The statehood act provided for deeding to the state, within 25 years, up to 103,350,000 acres (41,824,000 hectares)—more than a quarter of Alaska's total area. (Alaska selected the lands for takeover.) Lands taken over by the state could be sold to individuals or corporations for farms, home sites, or factory sites. Ownership did not include mineral rights, which could be leased by the state. Producing oil wells were required to pay royalties to the state.

Alaska is responsible for the management of fisheries and wildlife resources on all but federally owned lands. The state constitution provides that replenish able resources belonging to the state—fish, wildlife, forests, and grasslands—be utilized on the “sustained yield” principle. According to this principle of conservation, only the annual surplus or increase of the resources should ever be used so as not to decrease the basic stock of animals or the supply of trees and grasslands. Millions of waterfowl summer on Alaska's rocky islands and expansive wetlands. Birds of prey include bald and golden eagles, owls, hawks, and falcons. The willow ptarmigan (Arctic grouse), seen in flocks of several hundred, is the state bird. Fur seals breed on the Pribilof Islands. Sea otters, once hunted almost to extinction, are now carefully protected.


The finest big-game hunting and fishing in the United States is available in Alaska. Among the many types of brown bears found in the state is the famous Kodiak—a type of grizzly bear that is the largest of all living carnivorous land mammals, weighing up to 1,700 pounds (770 kilograms). Other native species are the black and polar bears. Alaskan wildlife also includes caribou (reindeer), moose, elk, bison, Sitka black-tailed deer, the Dall sheep, and the mountain goat. Reindeer, or domesticated caribou, are herded in parts of western Alaska. The state's waterpower resources are enormous, but they have not yet been fully exploited. Still, hydroelectric plants are Alaska's leading source of renewable energy. Most existing hydroelectric projects serve the southeast and south-central parts of the state. Snettisham, near Juneau, Eklutna, near Anchorage, and Bradley Lake on the Kenai Peninsula, are the largest.


